Jeff Plagge

'78 Agricultural Business
Spirit Lake, Iowa

Jeff Plagge's impressive career spans more than 40 years and has positively impacted all levels of Iowa's banking industry. In 2019, Plagge was appointed superintendent of the Iowa Division of Banking by Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds. In this role, Plagge leads the regulation of all state-chartered banks and has regulatory and licensing authority over Iowa lenders, mortgage businesses, real estate appraisers and appraisal management companies.

A respected leader, Plagge has served as chief executive officer of four Iowa banking organizations, ranging in asset size from \$92 million to \$2.4 billion. In 2020, Plagge retired from his most recent role as chief executive officer of Northwest Financial Corporation, a family-owned bank holding company based out of Arnolds Park, Iowa.

Plagge's expertise has been sought after at a national level via service on boards and committees for the Federal Reserve Bank of

Chicago, American Bankers Mutual Insurance, Sheltered Harbor, The Clearing House, and the American Bankers Association. Locally, his service includes leadership positions on the boards of Delta Dental of Iowa, the American Red Cross Central Iowa Chapter, and the Iowa Banker's Association. He currently serves on the board of directors for Northwest Financial Corporation and its subsidiaries.

Plagge's distinctive service has earned recognition with the prestigious American Bankers Association Bruning Award, the Iowa Bankers Association James A. Leach Award, and the BankBeat Banker of the Year Award.

A dedicated Cyclone, Plagge is a life member of the Iowa State University Alumni Association and has served as president of the board of trustees for the Iowa State University Agricultural Endowment.

George Washington Carver Distinguished Service Award

Dewayne L. Goldmon

Pine Bluff, Arkansas

Dewayne Goldmon is a recognized national leader in diversity and inclusion in agriculture. He played a pivotal role in creating the National Black Growers Council, an organization with a mission of improving the sustainability of Black row-crop farmers. He currently serves as executive director of the organization, and manages his family's 1,400-acre farm operation near Pine Bluff, Arkansas. In 2021, Goldmon was appointed senior advisor for racial equity to U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, Tom Vilsack.

Goldmon's work in diversity and inclusion began during his undergraduate studies at the University of Arkansas, where he worked to recruit students of color. During his graduate studies at Iowa State University, Goldmon was a member of the college's minority programs team, recruiting and advising undergraduate students of color. He was a founding member and advisor of the Iowa State Minorities in Agriculture Natural Resources and Related Sciences (MANRRS) student organization.

Following graduation, Goldmon had a highly successful career in the agricultural seed and chemical industry, working in technology and product development, government affairs, and human resources. He retired in 2019 as the outreach lead for Bayer Crop Sciences.

Throughout his career, Goldmon's commitment to diversity and inclusion has remained steadfast. He is currently serving his third term on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Advisory Committee on Minority Farmers and serves on boards for MANRRS, the Southern Risk Management Education Center and the Policy Center for Socially Disadvantaged Farmers and Ranchers.

Goldmon is an avid supporter of higher education, serving on the advisory boards for the University of Arkansas Bumpers College of Agricultural, Food, and Life Sciences; University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff; and Tuskegee University. He regularly presents to Iowa State students through the Department of Agronomy seminar series and the MANRRS student organization.

Roger Carlsson

'78 Agricultural Business
London, United Kingdom

A veteran investment and risk officer, Roger Carlsson, chairman of First Continental Trading Group of Companies (FCT), is a driving force in the global investment management industry.

In 1984, Carlsson founded FCT, basing the company in Chicago, Illinois. An active member on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange and Chicago Board of Trade, Carlsson grew FCT into a globally-recognized investment firm and one of the largest independent market making and proprietary trading groups in the world. With operations in key global financial centers, FCT was one of the largest independent shareholders of the London International Financial Futures Exchange, an organization eventually acquired by the New York Stock Exchange.

Following his graduation from Iowa State University in 1978, Carlsson earned a master's degree in business administration from DePaul

University and continued his studies at the London Business School, earning the organization's Alumni Achievement Award in 2004, and currently serves on the school's board of directors.

In 1998, Carlsson founded the Carlsson Family Foundation, which he established to manage his charitable contributions and provide a research vehicle for other donors wishing to make informed philanthropic decisions.

Carlsson's philanthropy has extended to Iowa State University students. In 2018, he helped establish the Paul Doak Agricultural Business Recruiting Scholarship by launching a match-gift giving challenge to College of Agriculture and Life Sciences alumni and friends. In addition, he frequently hosts College of Agriculture and Life Sciences study abroad students visiting the United Kingdom.

Betsy Freese, executive editor for Meredith Agrimedia and Successful Farming magazine, is a nationally-acclaimed media executive and industry leader.

Freese is a pioneer in agricultural communications, having grown the reach of her platforms to meet the needed technological advancements of the organization's national audiences.

Throughout her 36-year tenure with Meredith Agrimedia, Freese helped build the Successful Farming brand from a beloved magazine to one of the top online resources in the farming and ranching industries.

For the past 26 years, she's served as publisher for the Pork Powerhouse rankings, an annual report of the world's top pork producers. In 2017, she was honored as a Folio magazine's Top Women in Media Industry Leadership awardee. In 2019, her work with the Pork Powerhouse rankings won her Folio's top award

for a single article. Freese was the founding editor of Living the Country Life magazine, growing the brand from a quarterly publication to a multi-faceted media presence.

Her professional achievements have netted her national accolades, earning the President's Award from both the American Agricultural Editors' Association and the North American Agricultural Journalists.

Throughout her career, Freese has served as a mentor to aspiring journalists and communicators. She helps supervise Meredith Agrimedia's apprentice program and is a supporter of student organizations at Iowa State University and Drake University. Her philanthropy extends to her community, where Freese serves on the board of directors for the Des Moines Metro Opera Board of Trustees and the Indianola Public Library.

Colin Hurd, strategic initiatives manager for Raven Industries, is a rising entrepreneur in the agricultural technology industry.

As an Iowa State University student, Hurd participated in the Agricultural Entrepreneurship Initiative, founded Agricultural Concepts and developed TrackTill, a planter attachment designed to minimize soil compaction.

In 2016, Hurd joined the inaugural cohort of the Iowa State University Start-Up Factory and Ag Start-Up Engine and founded Smart Ag, a company focused on commercializing autonomous farming solutions to help address the labor shortage in production agriculture. Smart Ag's first product, AutoCart, allows farmers to automate a grain-cart tractor, providing critical labor savings to farmers during harvest.

Hurd's innovation has landed him recognition on local and national stages. In 2016, Hurd was honored as a STATEment Maker by the

Iowa State University Alumni Association. In 2019, he was recognized in Forbes' 30 Under 30 class for manufacturing and industry and AgGrad's 30 Under 30 class.

In 2019, SmartAg was acquired by Raven Industries. Hurd's role in the company allows him to continue innovating as he works to grow and develop products to advance the agriculture industry and serve farmers.

Hurd's philosophy of service was evident during his time as a student. He was a member of Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity and participated in Dance Marathon, VEISHEA, and Cardinal Key. His commitment to service continued post-graduation. Following the loss of his infant son, Hurd and his wife, Kimberly, founded the Kolbe Scott Fund in his honor. Proceeds were used to build an orphanage in India.

This education prepared her well for roles in healthcare finance, strategy, and operations—and her current role as president and CEO of Spectrum Health System.

As chief executive officer, Freese Decker oversees an \$8 billion health system comprised of 30,000+ team members, 14 hospitals, a medical group, and a health plan with more than 1 million members. Her collaborative, strategic, and visionary leadership has helped evolve Spectrum Health into the system it is today: leading with a bold vision of personalized healthcare made simple, affordable, and exceptional.

While a student at Iowa State, Freese Decker was active in Sigma Kappa sorority and the Iowa State Marching Band. She chose Iowa State because the campus felt like home. She knew she could be successful here, learn, and go out into the world prepared to thrive.

Known today as a change agent with a track record of forging strong community partnerships, executing innovative strategies, and fostering a people-focused culture, Freese Decker is routinely interviewed on national podcasts and invited to serve as a guest speaker. At 2AU, Ann designs custom and one-of-a-kind jewelry and curates the gallery's collection of art from artists worldwide. She co-produces Gallery Night twice a year in Valley Junction. Ann's work is in numerous art collections throughout the U.S. She is a member of the Society of North American Goldsmiths, American Craft Council, Jewelers of America, Des Moines Art Center, and the Historic Valley Junction Foundation.

Ann received the Outstanding Young Alumni Award from the ISU Alumni Association in 1996. She has served on the College of Design Dean's Advancement Council and the Department of Art and Visual Culture Advisory

Susan Hoffman is the studio owner and lead designer of DESIGNS! (Susan Hoffman Interior Designs). She specializes in both new home construction and in remodeling/renovation, which she defines as “seeing possibilities where others see problems.” Her portfolio of residential interior design work crosses the United States from California to New York and extends to the Caribbean. Her projects frequently are photographed for publication, including a recent designer show-house interior featured on Houzz.

Hoffman's interior design career began with Tom Klemuk Interiors in Cedar Falls. She later worked with Dayton's interior design studio in downtown Minneapolis, Minnesota, prior to earning her National Council for Interior Design Qualification certification and founding her own interior design firm.

An active member of the American Society of Interior Designers, Hoffman has served multiple roles on the board of ASID Minnesota

and the Dakotas, including chapter president in 1998 and 1999. She received the ASID Minnesota Presidential Citation seven times in the 1980s, 1990s, and 2000s, and was awarded the national ASID Presidential Citation in 1999.

Hoffman has been a tireless supporter of the ISU Department of Interior Design, providing design studio field trip opportunities and curated learning experiences in residential design. She reviewed and judged a campus fraternity's competition to renovate their resource center and inspired an ongoing series of aging-in-place wellness projects in the College of Design.

Rod Kruse heads the Des Moines office of BNIM Architects, where he is recognized nationally for creating client-focused solutions that demonstrate the responsible use of natural and financial resources, enhance client performance, and winning accolades for design excellence. His portfolio includes more than 110 higher education projects and studies on 14 campuses: among them, Iowa State University's Troxel Hall and the University of Iowa's Stanley Museum of Art; corporate office and research facilities; parking structures; cultural facilities; and private residences.

Kruse's work has received nearly 80 design awards, including three national American Institute of Architects Honor Awards for Architecture, an AIA Honor Award for Interior Architecture, an AIA Committee on the Environment Top Ten Award, and an AIA COTE Top Ten Plus Award. He is a fellow of the

AIA. In 2014 he was awarded AIA Iowa's Medal of Honor, the highest honor bestowed by the chapter.

Prior to joining BNIM in 2005, Kruse was a founding principal of HLKB Architecture for 18 years. He began his career at RDG Bussard Dikis (now RDG Planning and Design).

In addition to his design work, Kruse is a mentor, educator, leader, advocate, and volunteer. He served on the AIA Fellows jury from 2002-2004, chaired the AIA National Honor Awards jury in 2012, and was a member of the AIA COTE Top Ten jury in 2013. He served on the ISU Department of Architecture's advisory council for many years and recently was hired as the department's first full professor of practice. He is an ISU Alumni Association life member.

Johnny Alcivar is the director of workforce programs at Proteus, Inc., a multi-state nonprofit organization that assists agricultural workers. In this role, he is responsible for the delivery of the National Farmworker Jobs Program — funded by the U.S. Department of Labor Employment and Training Administration — in Indiana, Iowa, and Nebraska. The program targets chronic unemployment and underemployment in agriculture by facilitating career and training services for farmworkers who seek to retain employment or gain new opportunities.

Carla M. Koehler

'86 Biochemistry; MS '89 Biochemistry and Molecular Biology; PhD '95 Biochemistry and Molecular Biology
Los Angeles, California

Carla Koehler runs her own lab—the Koehler Lab—at the University of California Los Angeles, where she is also a professor in the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry. Koehler has established a leading research program that uses fundamental biochemical and genetic approaches to characterize mitochondrial assembly pathways, which has broad implications for mitochondrial dysfunction in degenerative diseases of muscles and the neural system.

Her lab pioneered studies characterizing an oxidation-reduction pathway for the import of proteins and a pathway for the assembly of inner membrane proteins, and the lab is also developing a chemical biology approach to develop new modulators—termed MitoBloCKs—of mitochondrial biogenesis.

Koehler was named a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in

2019. Her other numerous awards and accolades include an Established Investigator Award from the American Heart Association, a Damon Runyon Walter Winchell Scholar Award, and a Beckman Young Investigator Award. She also received the ISUAA's Outstanding Young Alumni Award in 2003.

Koehler currently serves on the scientific advisory board of the United Mitochondrial Disease Foundation. She also reviews grants and regularly serves as a panel member for the American Heart Association and the Department of Defense. She is the current chair of the Neural Oxidative Metabolism, Mitochondria, and Cell Death (NOMD) Study Section at the National Institutes of Health.

In addition to mentoring three UCLA Regent Scholars every year, Koehler takes time to visit Ivanhoe Elementary School annually to teach a hands-on module about zebrafish biology to second grade students.

Koehler is a life member of the ISU Alumni Association and belongs to Order of the Knoll President's Circle.

After earning a bachelor's degree in economics from Iowa State University in 1982 and a master's degree and Ph.D. in economics from the University of Illinois in 1984 and 1987, respectively, David Wheelock secured a position with the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis in 1993, where he has worked for nearly 30 years. In his current role as senior vice president and senior policy advisor, Wheelock advises the bank's president on monetary policy and conducts policy-related economic research. In addition, he contributes to the administration of the massive data resource known as the Federal Reserve Economic Data (FRED).

Before joining the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis, Wheelock was a faculty member in the Department of Economics at the University of Texas at Austin. He has authored numerous articles and books on the establishment and history of the Federal Reserve and its monetary

policy for professional journals and Federal Reserve publications.

Wheelock ranks among the top 3% of all economic researchers worldwide, according to the Economic Ranking System. In his areas of research, he ranks 42nd globally in economic history, 44th in banking, and 22nd in monetary policy based on citations of his work.

Wheelock has returned to Iowa State on occasion to give lectures and speak to the ISU Economics Club, where he offers an overview of the Federal Reserve System, its responsibilities, and current challenges with monetary policy. He also discusses employment opportunities in the Federal Reserve System for undergraduates with economic degrees.

Justin Hines' academic career may be short, but he has built a resume that is long and distinguished. Hines is an associate professor of chemistry at Lafayette College in Easton, Pennsylvania, where he teaches multiple courses in chemistry and biochemistry and runs a productive, federally funded undergraduate research laboratory.

Hines conducts research on the misfolding of proteins to form amyloids, which are associated with numerous human diseases, including Parkinson's, Alzheimer's, and prion diseases. He has received grants from the National Institutes of Health, the Research Corporation for Science Advancement (RCSA), and the Dreyfus Foundation, among others. Hines is currently co-authoring the 10th edition of "Biochemistry," one of the most popular biochemistry textbooks in the world.

Hines has received national and institutional awards for his teaching and scholarship. In 2015,

RSCA named Hines a Cottrell Scholar in recognition of significant excellence in both research and educational initiatives. In 2018, he was just one of eight winners nationally of the prestigious Henry Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Award. In addition, he has been honored for his teaching and educational contributions by Lafayette College, the National Academies, and Iowa State University.

Hines shares his expertise by giving numerous invited research seminars and national or international conference talks. He also visits high school classes to present chemistry demonstrations and talk about college success and career planning. Most recently, he started a project with students to address issues of diversity, equity, and inclusion in STEM classes.

Hines is an annual member of the ISU Alumni Association.

There are more than 1,000 institutions in 49 countries that have earned AAALAC accreditation. As global director, he oversees the accreditation program, and represents and promotes the organization's mission globally.

Dr. Borkowski has over 30 years of experience in academic and pharmaceutical laboratory animal medicine. He has worked at major international research institutions including Vanderbilt University, Pennsylvania State University, Upstate Medical Center, Monsanto, Pfizer, Pharmacia, and Eli Lilly and Company. He also worked at the Kennedy Space Center on Space Shuttle Life Sciences missions for the commercial development of microgravity research.

Throughout his career, Dr. Borkowski has been recognized for his outstanding contributions in support of the welfare of animals used in science in the academic and industry positions where he was employed. He also advanced the welfare of animals through his volunteer service in numerous professional organizations such as the American Society of Laboratory Animal Practitioners where he served on the board of directors and as President (1995-2000), and the American College of Laboratory Animal Medicine where he rose through the ranks of president-elect to president in 2015.

From 1995-2005, Dr. Borkowski served as the alternate representative on the American Veterinary Medical Association's Legislative Advisory Committee. He's also lent his expertise as a scientific reviewer for the Journal of Wilderness Medicine and Contemporary Topics in Laboratory Animal Science.

Laura Molgaard is highly regarded and recognized for her leadership and vision in identifying and implementing broad systemic changes in veterinary education. As a member of the American Association of Veterinary Medical Colleges, Molgaard led an international group of veterinary educators to develop a modern, adaptable, and comprehensive competency framework for veterinary education to guide curriculum revision and student assessment in order to graduate students who are successful from their first day as veterinarians. This groundbreaking initiative was recognized by the AAVMC as one of the most substantial pedagogical projects undertaken. In 2020, Molgaard and her group were honored with the AAVMC's Presidential Award for Meritorious Service.

At the University of Minnesota College of Veterinary Medicine, Molgaard has led initiatives in veterinary pipeline development, admissions, diversity, and culture/climate.

In 2019, she received the Outstanding Faculty Award by the Minnesota Veterinary Medical Association. She was inducted into the Academy of Excellence in the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (2015) at the University of Minnesota. In 2012 the University of Minnesota recognized her with the Access Achievement Award for her work in providing equitable access in the college for all aspects of learning for veterinary students with disabilities.

After graduation from Iowa State in 1991, Molgaard was a private small animal practitioner. In 1997, she joined the faculty at the University of Minnesota College of Veterinary Medicine as a clinical instructor, rising through the academic ranks to become the associate dean for academic affairs in 2001, prior to her appointment as interim dean in 2019.

For over 40 years Charles Lemme has been a shining example of a public servant through his leadership in organized veterinary profession. His strong sense of responsibility for the future of the profession drove him to serve at the local, state and national levels of the profession where his efforts continue to benefit future generations of veterinarians.

Lemme became involved in organized veterinary medicine early in his career as a small animal practitioner in Evanston, Illinois, serving as a committee chair and board member of the Chicago Veterinary Medical Association. In 1985, he returned home to Iowa, where he served in numerous leadership positions in the Iowa Veterinary Medical Association, including as a committee chair, board member, and president in 2007. Locally, Lemme was an active member and president of the Linn County Veterinary Medical Association (1988) and Eastern Iowa Veterinary Medical Association (1994).

Throughout his career, Lemme was someone who others sought out for input into challenging and critical issues facing the profession. His organizational skills and ability to bring people together were invaluable in the national roles he served within the profession, as a former area director for the American Animal Hospital Association, and currently as an executive board member of the American Veterinary Medical Association.

He also served his community by leading the pet recovery efforts in the Cedar Rapids area during the floods of 2008.

In 2015, Lemme was the recipient of the Iowa Veterinary Medical Association's Veterinarian of the Year Award. In 1993, the AAHA presented him with the Excel Award for his achievements.

Sherry Johnson is well-known as an energetic entrepreneur, visionary, and collegial collaborator.

She is a partner and co-founder of two businesses, Equine Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation and Equine CORE, Inc., the nation's first equine-focused, specialist-owned and operated tele-rehabilitation service. Her expertise in the area of equine sports medicine has led to her and her practice serving as the official show veterinarians at major Quarter Horse events.

In 2013, Johnson completed an equine internship at Equine Medical Center of Ocala (Florida), followed by a year of private practice working with Quarter Horse and Thoroughbred athletes in Iowa and Texas. In 2015, she completed an equine diagnostic imaging fellowship at Colorado State University. She transitioned into the equine sports medicine and rehabilitation residency program at CSU & Equine Sports Medicine, LLC, pre-eminent

equine orthopedic research group in the nation. She earned a master's degree in veterinary clinical sciences (2018) from CSU and board-certification from the American College of Veterinary Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation (2019).

Currently, she is a post-doctoral fellow in the equine sports medicine program at CSU, while she completes her PhD. Her research focuses on tendon injury, repair and novel rehabilitation strategies related to tendon healing, which will have significant impacts on equine and human rehabilitation approaches. Johnson is licensed to practice in nine states. She has authored five peer-reviewed publications, seven textbook chapters, and 11 proceedings manuscripts. In 2019, she was the youngest member of the AAEP to have a prominent speaking role during its annual conference.

Johnson is the recipient of the American Quarter Horse Foundation Young Investigator Award (2018), named the EQUUS Foundation Research Fellow (2019), the Storm Cat Career Development Award (2020) from the Grayson-Jockey Club Research Foundation and the American Association of Equine Practitioners' President's Award (2020).

At the CTO, he leads Iowa State's efforts to identify and accelerate development of new technologies and innovations with strong commercial potential to support the state of Iowa's biosciences-based economic growth initiative.

Roof is a recognized expert in animal vaccine research and development. His contributions have had a significant global impact on animal health disease prevention. Prior to joining Iowa State in 2020, Roof spent nearly 30 years in the pharmaceutical industry, most of those years with Boehringer Ingelheim Vetmedica, Inc., where he served as global director of biologics research and development. Roof has been credited with the licensure of

over 20 animal health vaccines in pigs, cattle, dogs and cats. He has also been credited with over 30 patent applications for diseases in in animal health. He has authored over 40 peer-reviewed publications.

In 2005, Roof was recognized by Boehringer Ingelheim with its Innovator of the Year Award, recognizing his efforts to develop industry leading innovation in Salmonella and Lawsonia vaccines for animals. The Salmonella vaccine was licensed technology from ISU

Throughout his career, Roof has also been widely recognized for his ability as a gifted learner and teacher of complex ideas. His skill and passion to work in global collaborations allowed him the opportunity to lead teams of scientists in the US, Germany, and China.

Since 2000, Roof has served on the Ames Economic and Development Commission, where he was president from 2009-2010. He is a past member of the ISU Research Foundation (2005-2009) and iiCORP (2018-2020).

Svec worked at the Memorial Union from 1978 until 2010, retiring as the Memorial Union's marketing coordinator after 32 years of service. Her efforts to further the MU's marketing and graphic design goals, expand arts programs in non-credit classes, exhibitions, and permanent art collection, uncover and share the organization's history, and engage the community in the life of the MU left a mark that is still felt today.

In the fall of 2003, she planned the first Gold Star Hall Ceremony to honor those whose names were added to the memorial wall that year - instigating a new annual tradition. Each year, to develop each honoree's personal

biography, she would carefully research the personal and service histories of those honored by contacting surviving family members, local libraries and newspapers, the Iowa State yearbook, and university and military archives. In many cases, the ceremony provided much-needed closure for families.

Creatures great and small ... T. Robert Bashara has worked with them all. After graduating from Iowa State University and serving in the U.S. Army Veterinary Corps, Bashara began his own veterinary practice, the Mapleview Animal Clinic, in Omaha, Nebraska.

Bashara is involved in many respected organizations, including serving as CEO of the Doris Day Animal Foundation and the president of the Doris Day and Terry Melcher Foundation.

Bashara has participated in many impressive initiatives within the Doris Day Animal Foundation (DDAF). He was one of the founding advocates for Spay Day USA, which has grown into World Spay Day under the guidance of the Doris Day Animal League. Moreover, through a grant from DDAF, Bashara was instrumental in rescuing, rehabilitating, and releasing more than 200 sea lion pups after a crisis that led to them washing up on California shores. Bashara has also led initiatives that established the Doris Day Equine Center, a

facility for abused horses and wild mustangs in Texas. More recently, he instigated an endowment fund supported by DDAF for scholarships to veterinary students at Iowa State University who are studying shelter medicine.

Because of his achievements, Bashara has received many accolades and honors. In 2018, he was awarded the Animal Welfare Award from the American Veterinary Medical Association - one of only 18 people to have been honored with the award. The Iowa State College of Veterinary Medicine awarded Bashara with the Stange Award for Meritorious Service in Veterinary Medicine in 2018.

Bashara and his wife, Jan, live in Bennington, Nebraska. He is a member of the Order of the Knoll Campanile Society.

If you want to see Cyclone spirit, look no further than Barry Peterson. After settling in Texas, Peterson assisted in connecting Cyclones through the alumni club in Dallas-Fort Worth. He was elected to be the vice president of the group in 2013 before becoming president in 2014. It's a leadership position he continues to hold today.

Peterson has revitalized the Cyclone pride of the Dallas-Fort Worth community. One of his major successes has been organizing must-attend Cyclone game watches and tailgates. When he began assisting with the game watches, they had an average of 20 people in attendance. Prior to the pandemic, their most recent Cy-Hawk football game watches had grown to more than 300 people, while football tailgates that the group sponsors have topped more than 1,300 fans. Peterson has facilitated partnerships with other alumni groups in Texas to host joint

tailgates for neighboring games. Another crowd favorite is the annual Dallas-Fort Worth Cyclone Family Picnic.

Peterson has also worked to create a scholarship fund for local high school seniors. Through fundraising efforts and income from the club, two \$1,000 scholarships are awarded to students graduating from the Dallas-Fort Worth area annually. During his time as leader, the group has raised over \$60,000 to give to aspiring Cyclones and an endowed scholarship will launch in the 2022-23 academic year.

The Campanile ... the most iconic symbol of Iowa State University. Cyclones everywhere know the sound of the music flowing from the carillon bells. Tin-Shi Tam, the Charles T. & Ivadelle Cobb Cownie Professor of Music, is the artist in charge of playing the carillon inside of the bell tower. For the past 26 years, Tam has climbed 79 steps to the top of the Campanile to perform her concerts for students, faculty, and the residents of Ames every weekday. However, Tam's impact on the university spans beyond her musical talent.

Six years ago, Tam decided that she wanted to build a 1:5 scale replica of the Campanile. The replica would be functional as well as transportable. Her vision was to increase awareness about how the carillon functioned, as well as give alumni the opportunity to reminisce about their time on campus.

To achieve this goal, Tam and a team launched a campaign to raise \$210,000 to build the replica. While completing the replica's construction, Tam worked with more than 200 students, faculty, and staff from various academic backgrounds. This project was unveiled in 2019 at the Bells of Iowa State Anniversary Gala Concert.

Tam is the ex-officio of the Society of Carillon Alumni and Friends and also serves on the advisory committee of the Stanton Memorial Carillon Foundation. Tam is a member of the Order of the Knoll Campanile Society.

Students shared their experiences during Pride Month through the Daily's partnership with

The Center for LGBTQIA+ Student Success. These are two examples, with more examples being created daily by the paper's student staffers.

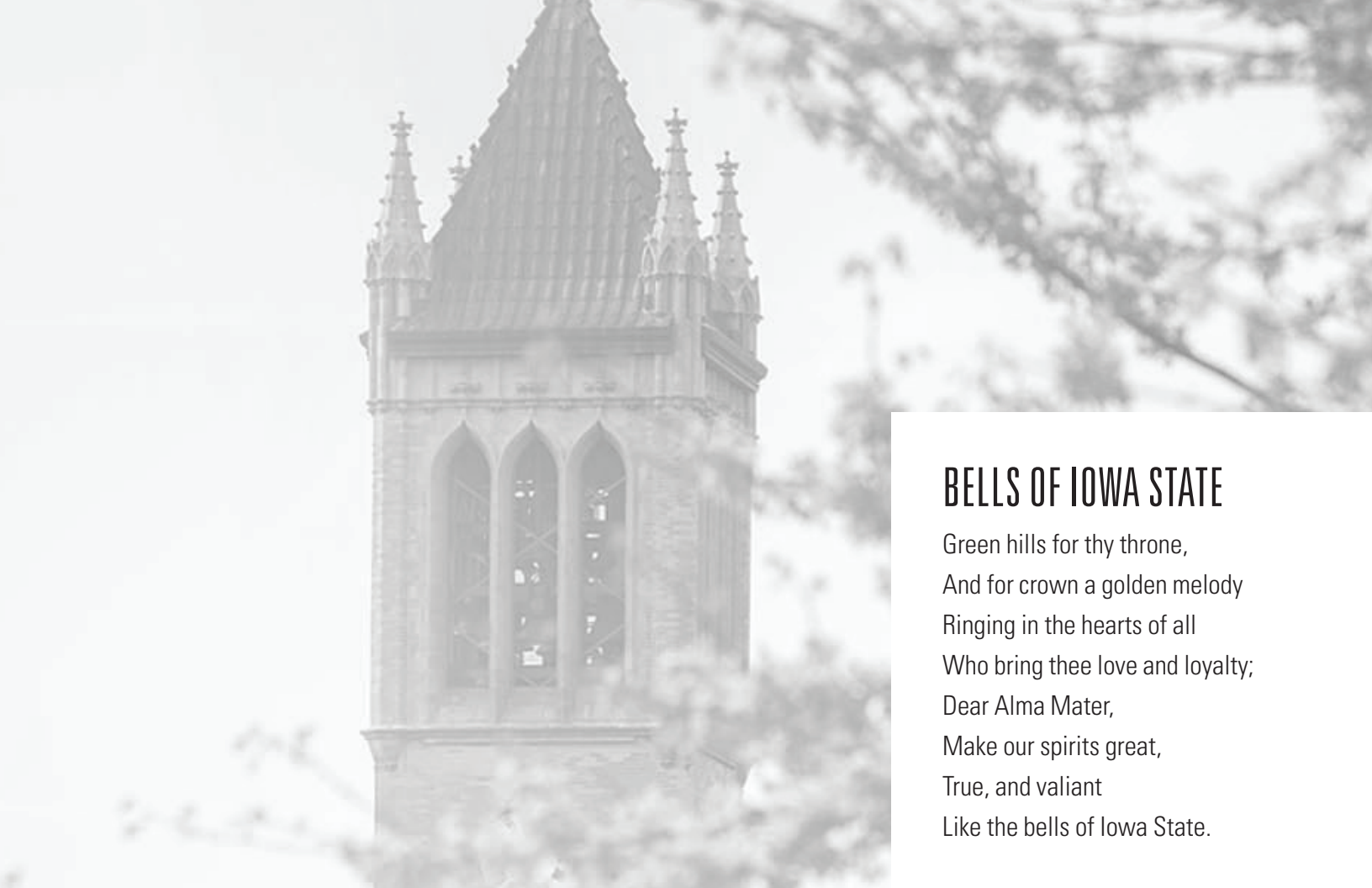
